### Vicar's Letter



ear Friends

After a dry spell, we've had so much rain and snow that the aquifers and reservoirs are full to bursting. This leaves us all wondering: What will next summer be like? I have a small, tattered clipping that I sometimes carry with me and pull out for purposes of private amusement. It is a weather forecast from the Western Daily Mail and it says, in toto: "Outlook: Dry and warm, but cooler with some rain." (Bill Bryson, *Notes from a Small Island*).

"Praise the Lord for times and seasons, cloud and sunshine, wind and rain; spring to melt the snows of winter till the waters flow again." (Timothy Dudley-Smith, *Fill our Hearts* with Joy and Gladness)

"God gives snow like wool; he scatters hoarfrost like ashes. He hurls down his crystals of ice like crumbs; who can stand before his cold? He sends out his word, and melts them; he makes his wind blow and the waters flow." (The Bible, *Psalm 147:16-18*).

The Bible's teaching is that the weather and the seasons are part of the way God has made the world. He has deliberately designed there to be an annual cycle of winter, with new life breaking out each spring, before everything dies down again in the autumn, and then round it goes again.

There is a reason why the world has been designed in this way. God has ordered the natural world so that life comes out of death, that day follows night, that spring comes after winter. He wants to point us to the fact that this is the pattern for the whole world. God wanted to give life to the world, but he could only do so after Jesus gave up his life for the world – paying the price of our sin. Those who follow Jesus receive forgiveness, adoption into God's family, and the promise of the fullest life for all eternity – but they only do so after giving up control of their lives to Jesus, recognising him to be the master. Indeed the whole history of our world is that God's good purposes for it are achieved only after we have failed and God has intervened to rescue it.

Resurrection and life follow death.

This is what we celebrate every Easter. This spring is no exception – come and join us in celebrating the God who brings life out of death.



Churchyard—There has been an outbreak of kerbing of graves in the Churchyard. This is against Diocesan regulations. The gist of these regulations are given to the next-of-kin when a person dies but as this is often a stressful time they often get overlooked. The reason for the ban on kerbs is that when nobody is left to tend a grave it can be turfed over and mowed. The south side of the Churchyard (below the Public Footpath) contains graves from the 1950-70s that can only be maintained by volunteers who try and keep the part inside the kerbs presentable. The Churchyard is a joint venture between the Parish Council and the Parochial Church Council and the co-operation of relatives of all who are buried there is requested. The regulations for the use of the Churchyard are displayed in the Church Porch.

The application is to demolish the existing Church hall, to build a new Church hall, and to build a new Vicarage at the opposite end of the field in which the hall is situated. The application also includes plans for West Kent Housing Association to build four new homes in Mary Burrows Gardens, and to reconfigure the parking spaces there.

What's wrong with the existing Vicarage? The existing building is overly large and expensive to heat and maintain. Its age means that it needs significant investment, which neither the Diocese nor the PCC can afford.

What's wrong with the existing Church Hall? The present (wooden-clad prefabricated) hall was never designed to stand as long as it has. Showing its age, it needs major repairs to the flooring and the electrics. The Church's needs have grown; the toilet and kitchen facilities are below standard, the Hall is too hot in summer and too cold in winter, and the office-space is too small for our Parish Administrator.

Why does the driveway cross the Churchyard? All the land-owners involved in the planned access route have given their consent, which was not the case with the alternatives. Very careful research has shown that there are no burials in the part of the Churchyard where the driveway will go.

**How is all this to be funded?** The Diocese will pay for the new Vicarage by selling the current vicarage once everything is completed. The PCC already has 3 sources of funding for the Church Hall: (i) We have been given significant legacies and other donations. (ii) The PCC owns the field in which the Hall is sited; the Diocese will buy part of it to build the new Vicarage. (iii) 50% of any profits made, if the proceeds from selling the Vicarage exceed the building costs of the new one, would go to the PCC.


The remaining costs for the Church Hall would be met by applying to grant-making bodies, inviting local residents to contribute, and other fund-raising activities.

**Plans** The plans detailed overleaf show the Church Hall Field with the proposed new Vicarage in the north-west corner and the new Church Hall in the south-east corner. A direct path would be introduced from the west door of the Church to give a level path for easy disabled access. The planning application was submitted jointly by the Rochester Diocesan Board of Finance, the Parochial Church Councils of St Mary's Kemsing & Woodlands, and the West Kent Housing Association. ### News from Cotmans Ash .....and home to Kemsing

sk a man or woman of Kemsing "Where do you live Mate?" and he will say to you, "Kemsing — Where else?" That sums up the feeling and love we people have for our village — you can understand that feeling when you first come as a visitor to our village, whatever the direction you travel, westward from Wrotham, eastward from Otford or in from Seal and Sevenoaks to the south, and whether it is Spring, Summer, Autumn or Winter, your first vision, your overriding impression will be hills, trees and open grassland; but it is not an architects mind that planned the landscape that you see or the layout of some master gardener, it is the product of a million years of weather and gradual evolution, the chalk rock, the flint stone, the great gashes and craters in the rugged downs that have been torn out and fashioned by the winds and storms of centuries past. The trees, shrubs, and open Downland you see today have all taken their place in the footsteps of time, and on the same ladder have come birds, mammals, insects, flowers, fungus and even man himself. That is the mainspring of the beauty and fascination you see before you today. Who is there who would separate them out from the web of life? Who would want to? They are the backbone of our village!

The trees, plants, animals and birds you see today will be not unlike any other seen by travellers over the centuries or even Chaucer's pilgrims journeying anywhere on the chalk route between Winchester and Canterbury – only the sombre green yews, gaunt and disfigured by the storms of centuries past bear witness to this ancient place – they also provide food and shelter for numerous birds, flocks of finches, thrushes and warblers, even the tiny goldcrest who slings her little hammock of mosses and lichen under the branches. Because of their great age and ability to survive in deprived conditions of pure chalk rock, great caverns form in their roots creating homes for badgers, foxes and rabbits in the warm dry chalk shelves – woodpeckers hammer into the bark for insects and tree creepers tuck their nests into the old shattered limbs.

A familiar sight from my high point on the Down at dawn or dusk is the large flights of black headed gulls in the southern sky who travel daily from the tip at Sundridge to the Medway estuary. Often in the same sky skeins of greylag geese honk and call to one another on their way home to the Wild Fowl Reserve at Bradbourne. Another early riser and great fisherman is the heron —long before Kemsing folk rise from their beds, he has plundered their fish ponds of goldfish and even frogs.

Now from my high seat rooks and jackdaws cross the evening sky calling and arguing amongst themselves as they journey westwards into the evening sunset – a molten ball, heaving and billowing in the blue margin between earth and sky as all goes quiet, until the creatures of the night take over, when your ears will serve you better than your eyes. A hunting vixen, her wailing scream echoing across the downland – rabbits drumming their warning of some unseen enemy, bats bouncing their almost inaudible signal as they navigate through the trees, and badgers, who have a tremendous range of sounds, from barking like dogs, squealing like piglets, sobbing like a child in distress to a high pitched scream – so much is known of badgers – so little I know of their language.

Tawny owls are night hunters. They too have a wide vocabulary – their familiar 'to-whit-to-whoo' to all sorts of little snores and grumbling. Herons cross the night sky 'Fraank Fraank' they call. In winter moonlight, not only will you see the Great Bear, the Milky Way or Orion striding his way westward to Otford, but large formations of ducks and many other wading birds, whose call and shapes I have never been able to identify, as they pass across the face of the winter moon.

### FAREWELL TOM



Tom went from Orchard Way in December last year to go and live with his daughter in Crowborough. A presentation was made to him at the Church Hall.

Tom was born in 1920 near Harwich in Essex and in 1938 in he joined the Home Office and was seconded to the Metropolitan Police. When WWII came he joined the Royal Artillery and was posted initially at home becoming a signals expert. In January 1942 he was commissioned as a 2<sup>nd</sup> Lieutenant, although he then had to become proficient at gunnery and so was sent for more training. This was fortunate because he married Doris (whom he had met when her parents lived in

Hildenborough) at St Mary's, Riverhead later on in 1942. – their first home was in Wimbledon.

Tom was being trained for the invasion of North Africa but was the victim of an accident that caused an injury to his leg. He thus missed the Allied landings in France but was sent to Germany in 1945 (after an intensive course in German) to help de-commission the German Army. He was finally released from the Army in the Autumn of 1946 with the rank of Captain. He joined London County Council, and worked in a division responsible for housing. After the formation of the GLC in 1974, worked for a further 10 years in Highways Construction before he retired.

In 1945 Tom's parents in law had bought a house in Dynes Road and Tom and Doris set up home there from 1946. The couple had three children: Tony, Barbara and Philip and moved to Orchard Way in February 1956 and Doris (who sadly died in 2006) began a career in local politics being first a member of the Kemsing Parish Council and ultimately the Chairman. She then became a member of the Sevenoaks RDC and was ultimately its Chairman, and then Chairman of the present Sevenoaks District Council. She would not have been able to follow this path without the strong support of her husband.

Doris' career did not leave Tom time to pursue other interests but he was very much involved in Church administration having attended St Mary's since 1946/7. He became the Secretary to the Parochial Church Council and was elected Vicar's Churchwarden, a position he held from 1966 until 1982. He was also a noted thespian and was a founder member of the KADS which became the Kemsing Players and Tom appeared in many plays.

Tom was a true gentleman of Kemsing and our best wishes follow him to his new abode.

### From Kemsing Church & Village News

### Extract from "Kemsing Church & Village News" 1963

The **St Mary's Thrift Club** was still in existence and thanks were due to Mrs Marsh who had kept it going and to Mrs Parkin of St Edith Farmhouse who had offered to continue it. The **Parish Council** approved the draft of an agreement with the **Parochial Church Council** for the financial management of the extended Churchyard. Mr **Mark Baldwin** was to give up looking after the St Edith's Well area which he had done for many years. **George Baldwin** would take his place. The Church **Organ** had expired and the congregation and choir were managing with a piano (and sometimes with a tuning fork!).

### Extract from "The Well" Spring 1988

Vic Bowden contributed an article about **St Edith's Farmhouse** detailing the construction and ownership of the old house, which had a foundation stone dated 1656 and the new house, which had been built in 1956. Doug Kitchener wrote of the events of **The Kemsing Gardener's Society** which maintained a trading hut by the entrance to Kemsing School. Peter Farr wrote about the **Poverty and Hope Appeal** that is well supported each year by the community in Kemsing. Money is sought for development projects for poor communities overseas. This year's project was about Stone Crushers in India.

The **Frank Johnson Memorial Fund** had been set up and was set to benefit from an organ recital in the Church by Bruce Burbridge (an organ scholar at Westminster Cathedral) and Christopher Angel (Assistant Organist at Coventry Cathedral).
