Vicar's Letter

ear Friends

We've all been thinking about the centenary of the outbreak of World War I. Less well known is that 5th July was the 60th anniversary of the first televised news bulletin in UK.

The Christian message is called "the gospel", a word which means "good news". It's what a herald would have



proclaimed in the ancient world - a momentous declaration of an epoch-changing event. Perhaps a royal birth, or a victory in battle, would be announced.

The eye-witnesses of what Jesus did and taught were in no doubt that he was the best news the world had ever heard. So they proclaimed this gospel. Their message included both a royal birth (Jesus, the long-promised rescuing king was born), and a victory in battle (as he defeated the forces of evil by paying for sin as he died on the cross, then rose again).

The Christian gospel is unlike the Roman proclamations of good news, and unlike the modern news bulletin. With news on top around the clock, much that passes for news is actually speculation or opinion. The Christian faith, like a good news bulletin, is anchored in verifiable historical events. However it is not just a theory or a philosophy; it is the account of what God really did over a 30 year period in the eastern Mediterranean.

The first BBC news bulletin didn't include a newscaster; (quite unlike today), the producers thought a presenter would detract from the seriousness of the news. By comparison, the Christian message is all about a person. Jesus is centre-stage; the Bible's good news is presented so that we might see Jesus, know him and follow him.

Many of the Roman Empire's official pronouncements were propaganda (as is quite a bit of today's news). Political leaders were being airbrushed in campaigns of positive spin. The hero of the Christian gospel is Jesus, a very different kind of leader. He willingly gave up his life to save his people; he came to bring genuine hope to the poor and the oppressed.

Then finally, so much news we hear today seems irrelevant. It's good to be informed of what's happening to others, but little of what we hear will directly impact us. The Bible's age-old message is ever relevant. There could be nothing more important to us than the offer of forgiveness of sins, friendship with God and hope in the face of death.

Knowing Jesus gives fresh meaning and purpose to everyday life and affects everything. That's not normally true of the 10 o'clock news. With every blessing. Your friend and vicar,

ST MARY'S KEMSING—PAROCHIAL CHURCH COUNCIL

It is nice to be able to report good news at last. The St Edith Club has kindly offered temporary office accommodation for the Parish Office where Margaret Robarts, our Parish Administrator, can once again have a proper office environment from which to work. Since April, Margaret has been working from my house and dining room table - not ideal! John Elliot has valiantly photocopied everything we gave him, free of charge, and so we have managed somehow. By the time this is published a new photocopier will be installed in Margaret's office, completing the equipment she needs to carry on the administration of the Parish.

A reminder that Margaret's hours are normally **Mondays**, **10-12noon**, **and Thursdays**, **10am-5pm**, but it is probably a good idea to ring first on the old number now re-connected, **01732 761351**, to make sure Margaret can expect you, as the Club's security has to be safeguarded.

The PCC appointed a Steering Group to agree the insurance claim covering all the church groups' losses in the Church Hall. This has been sent to the insurers now, and there should be sufficient funds to replace items as and when needed.

There is more good news we hope. Kemsing Parish Council is negotiating with Wealden Homes to buy the Village Car Park, which is currently leased to Sevenoaks District Council until 2016. If this sale goes through, then the Parish Council has indicated that "should the Diocese and/or the PCC make a planning application conditional on securing vehicular access rights over the car park, and if such an application were to be approved, Kemsing Parish Council would, in principle, agree to grant such vehicular rights, subject to acceptable financial terms being agreed". However, the Parish Council's recommendation on any such planning application would not be prejudiced by an negotiations which had taken place regarding the Car Park.

This could be a major step forward for the Church, as it would mean the West Kent Housing Association scheme, which was part of the refused planning application, will no longer be part of the Church's application, and that may help its progress through the planning process. It is understood that the Diocese may also be willing to contribute a sum for the right of access which would help towards the cost of buying the Car Park.

It is hoped that a fresh planning application can be submitted to Sevenoaks District Council soon, and I would urge as many people as possible to keep a look out for the chance, either online or via the Parish Council, to support it. Until we have planning permission, the PCC cannot start applying for grants to help the cost of building a new Church Hall.

The Annual General Meeting of the <u>Parish Council</u> was held on Wednesday, 21st May 2014 when Mrs. Marie Cole was re-elected as Chairman and Mr. Godfrey Croughton as Vice-Chairman for the ensuing year.

Village car park – The Parish Council is currently negotiating with the present owner to purchase the village car park.

Saturday afternoon bus services — I am pleased to inform residents Kemsing Parish Council, together with Seal Parish Council, have been successful in securing 3 additional Saturday afternoon journeys to Kemsing with Go-Coach Limited. Funding was sourced by a contribution from Mr. Nick Chard's Kent County Council Members' Fund and Kemsing Parish Council's own funds. (Seal Parish Council contribution to be confirmed). District Councillor Lorraine Stack is also in the process of placing a bid with the Sevenoaks District Council's Big Community Fund. This service will be trialled for 6 months during which time the number of people using these 3 journeys will be monitored to establish whether it would be feasible to continue in the long-term. Residents are urged to use these extra journeys whenever they can as their continuation after the end of this year will depend upon the usage made of them.

KEMSING COMMEMORATES THE START OF WORLD WAR ONE

From Thursday July 31st to Monday August 4th, Kemsing, along with almost every other City, Town and Village in Great Britain, commemorated the 100th anniversary of the start of World War One in 1914.

Barbara Brown, and the Flower Arrangers of St. Mary's Church put on a splendid display of Floral Tributes to those who fell during the war, and some photos of these can be seen on page 7. On Thursday 31st July, there was an evening of Poetry readings associated with WW1 in the Church, and some 50 members of the public came along to hear varied reading ranging from extracts from the Wipers Times to those poems more usually associated with WW1.

On Friday August 1st, Janet Eaton gave a talk to members of the Heritage Centre Association based on her book 'Lest we Forget' and featuring episodes of life in Kemsing during WW1 with some biographies and photos of those men from the village who lost their lives during the conflict.

On Saturday 2nd August the 49 members of the Kemsing Community Choir sang songs from 'South Pacific' and songs from WW1 to a packed house in St. Mary's Church. Everyone enjoyed singing along to the old songs and £365 was raised towards the re-building of St. Mary's Church Hall. The Community Choir started as a 'one-off' for the last Kemsing Festival in 2011 but it proved so popular that this was their fourth performance and they hope to carry on in their own 'unique' style in 2015.

On Sunday morning, a special service was held in Church at 9.15am remembering the Kemsing war dead from WW1. The Flower Commemoration carried on until Monday August 4th. One of the special ideas for this was a book in which anyone could write their own family memories of WW1, featuring their grandparents or even their great grandparents, who could then have their story read by anyone who cared to and they made fascinating reading. It is hoped that it might be possible for the book to be displayed again so that other villagers could give details of their own family during WW1.

'Lights out' the nationwide event to mark the start of the war on Monday August 4th at 10pm was also marked by the lighting of a lantern at the War Memorial. Those who served from the village during World War One will not be forgotten.

Flanders & Ypres – 21st June 2014.

On Saturday 21st June, 45 members of the Kemsing Heritage Centre travelled by coach to Belgium to visit the military cemeteries in which soldiers from the village are buried.

At Lijssenthoek Military Cemetery we remembered Harry Nye originally from Kemsing, who died from wounds on 29th September 1917 and who is buried here. We left a wreath and a brief biography at his grave, so that other visitors would know a little more about him. A most interesting museum gave us all plenty of food for thought.

A visit to Talbot House in Poperinge near Ypres followed, with a look at their attic Chapel, resting area and beautiful garden. This was home during World War One to all ranks and all men and the founding home of TocH. We then visited the New Military Cemetery at Dickebusch to honour the memory of Harold Avery, son of the village butcher, who was killed on 8th July 1917 at the age of 23. Here I was honoured to lay a wreath and read the words of the British Legion Exhortation.

We travelled on to Ypres and the Menin Gate. Here we remembered Arthur Slade whose name is engraved on the gate along with 54,896 other men who have no known grave. We left poppy crosses beside his name, and Janet Eaton laid a wreath during the 8pm 'Last Post' Ceremony. The 'Last Post' is blown every night by the buglers of the Ypres Fire Brigade and on this night it became a very special occasion as music was provided by the pipes and drums of the London Scottish Regiment. On the occasion of the St. Edith Festival on 16 September there was a civic service in the Church in memory of **Sir Mark Collet**. At the St. Edith Hall Brigadier Norman (one of Sir Mark's descendants) unveiled an inscription recording Sir Mark's gift. There were tributes to Sir Mark from Mrs Doris Dew and Mr Leonard Lowing. Details about the Hall were outlined (including the provision of electric light by Sir Oliver Lyle until 1962).

An **Art** Exhibition in the Church Hall of artists from Kemsing was a notable village occasion. There were 19 exhibitors plus two juniors.

The Parish Council gave approval for the extension to the **Working Men's Club** at the Hall.

The *Cricket* Club had had a highly successful season and the cricket table was to be relaid in time for the 1965 season.

Mr Fenton retired as the **Parish Clerk** and was succeeded by Mrs Lawrence.

The Vicar had approved the sale of his top garden for old people's dwellings (the present day Mary Burrows Gardens) and hoped that the upkeep of **vicarage** and garden would prove more economical and labour saving.

There was a profile of **Margaret Foss** who had been a teacher at Kemsing School for 25 yeas and had recently volunteered to go to Liberia in West Africa. Also of **Dennis Markham**, the landlord of The Bell.

Patricia Douglas recalled her upbringing at **Wybournes** in the beginning of the 20th Century. Whilst her father was causing the re-building of the present Wybournes the family stayed at the Box House.

Doug Kitchener wrote about the activities of the **Gardeners' Society**, and Robin Edmunds contributed an article on the **Singers**, who were looking for a new accompianist to succeed Marjorie Gardner. Cyril Shrimpton had been to see Billy **Graham** at Earls Court.

WHERE THE BROWN BUZZARDS FLY—News from Cotmans Ash

A ugust and September are the months that split the difference between Summer and Autumn –flower has turned to seed and fruit. The birds have gone quiet – many will be building up for the long journey of migration – that miracle of navigation that lures them south to the sunshine of Africa. Swallows, swifts, martins and the tiny warblers, some little more than an ounce of fur and feathers, hurled across the oceans in the trade winds like shuttlecocks – others follow the southern rivers to the sea. It saddens my heart to see then go – so much can happen between now and when they return next May.

A rare and lovely memory this year were the wild roses on the hedge tops in the lanes and country roads of Kent – beautiful simple flowers in the palest pink that turn to red rosehips. Another wild beauty is the trailing white rose. The Briar Rose is a rare local beauty with the scent of green apples – it is also the Rose of Eglantine chosen by Titania the fairy queen in A Midsummer Night's Dream.

It seems there are none who really know why the red rose became the emblem of England as a nation, or what the rose was called. Is the clue on Bosworth Field when the white Rose of York, the rose ensoleil took on the Red Rose of Provence and Lancaster ending in the blending of the Tudor Rose – Is that the emblem of England?

The backdrop to Kemsing village is the North Downs of Kent – unlike many I live high on the Kemsing Hills and share my place with all manner of Nature's children. In recent years we have played host to a pair of buzzards who raise their family with us. Like many other Kemsingites we are greatly entertained by their aerobatics. True masters of the sky, they hover and dip and dive – gentle old fellows forever calling to one another. Why buzzards have moved from the tors and coombs of the West Counties to the North Downs of Kent is an unsolved riddle – could it be that the rabbits have migrated east?

I write my note from my high seat, watching a giant combine harvesting the barley on Seal Chart. Where have all the sparrows gone I am asked, and I answer the question with a question.

"Where?" I really don't know. Visions come of childhood in rickyards and barley fields and those great "whirring" brown flocks of house sparrows leaving the corn ricks or swarming round the threshing machine – finding their nests pugged up in the ivy – an untidy hay ball lined with feathers and 6 – 8 eggs whitish with grey freckles. They slept in trees, barns, in the eaves, anywhere. Their twittering was the perfect backdrop for the dawn chorus – but there, they have gone, so have the rick builders, the threshing teams and the sound of corn sheaves dropping into the thresher, the slap of that great belt driving the thresher from the massive steam engine – kids with sticks laying into the rats and mice, barking dogs, the rick master forever calling out for more sheaves and so much dust as the chaff shot out the back of the clattering threshing machine – chaos, utter chaos, all gone now! Threshers will never return, but I am sure the sparrows will!

From Parish Council Minutes-January to June 1989

It was agreed to apply for grants to help pay for the planting of trees on Green Hill together with two metal gates and three kissing gates, cost £4,500.

Dave Wellman reported that toads were on the move. 90% of toads had been lost in Kent in the last few years. One of their routes was across Pilgrims Way, and he brought along a sign depicting a toad to warn motorists.

The Council had written to the newly formed West Kent Housing Association asking that they discuss with Crest Homes, the developer, the possibility that the housing scheme would help locally generated needs.

Babs Watson wrote urging immediate action for signs indicating where toilets were available. The Council agreed to write to the District Council asking for a feasibility study to be carried out for the provision of public toilets [since built and now maintained by the Parish Council].


