Vicar's letter

ear Friends

This is an unusual letter to write; because of the copy deadlines for *The Well* magazine, I had to write this before I began my 3 month sabbatical. I have no idea what will be in the news by the time this is published, so it's impossible to write a topical letter.



So I thought I'd try something different. I often hear it said that the Christian faith is complicated and hard to understand. Certainly, God is infinitely deep, so we never run out of new things to discover. But at its heart, the Christian message is actually very simple. I thought I'd set myself the challenge of summarising it in the few hundred words I have here.

It all starts with God. Science may have lots to say about how the world came into being, but the Bible starts by telling us who made sure it did. God made the world, and us. As our maker, he also owns us. He has the right to tell us how to live. True happiness will be found in knowing him, delighting in him more than anything, and caring for the world as he intends.

But that's not how things are today. We threw off his rule, and find our happiness in other things cannot bear the weight of being the centre of our lives. God will not turn a blind eye when we upend him in this way. He has set a day when Jesus will return to this world as judge, to punish all that is not right. It means we are all in deep trouble.

But that's not the end of the story. Love is the quality at the centre of God's character, and God loved us so much that his Son was born as the human being Jesus. He lived the perfect life we never have, but then was killed on a Roman cross. As he died, darkness fell, and the judgement of God fell on the person of Jesus. He was punished for the things we do wrong.

The story still has not ended. On day 3, he rose again, and is still alive, wonderfully and bodily, today. Death is defeated; Jesus is victorious. Our forgiveness is assured, and one day he'll raise all who trust him to a similarly wonderful new life. God's original purpose to have us, delighting in him, living as he made us to be, will happen.

So we all have a choice. We can continue to reject God and his purposes, or we can accept Jesus' sacrificial death and ask him to turn our lives around to re-make us in this way.

This truly is the best news in the world. It's also not particularly complicated. See you soon!





The PCC signed a contract for the **first stage of the new Church Hall** and the contractors, GA Harper, started work in July as soon as all the planning conditions were signed off by Sevenoaks District Council. The Archaeology inspections which were required as part of these conditions did not reveal any startling surprises, just a few animal bones and bits of pottery. The survey which CSC Regeneration carried out throughout the village in June was useful, and we are grateful to all those who took part and gave their opinions about the future use of the new hall. The PCC's Fundraising Committee is continuing to explore possible grants as there is still a large shortfall in the sum needed to finish it.

A donation form is being distributed with *The Well* which we hope many people will use to help reach the figure needed (see page 3). More information is on the display board inside the Church with other alternative ways of giving. This information was also given in the Summer edition of *The Well*. See also page 27 for details of events in September and October.

James has completed his 3-month sabbatical, and was back in Church on **Sunday**, 8th **September**, after which there was a Church Barbecue which about one hundred people enjoyed. We are very grateful to all the visiting clergy who took the Church services during James' absence. We hope that James found that his break has helped him to take up the reins with renewed spiritual strength.

The 'Leisure Plots'

I was recently asked by someone, a newcomer to the village, why the Parish Council were selling off parts of the Downs above the village. Somewhat mystified, and sure that the Parish Council didn't have any intention of selling off any such land, I asked further, and discovered that she was asking about the land known in the village as the Leisure Plots, but for those other newcomers to the village, it seems to be worth giving some information about the heritage of these small parcels of land.

In 1975, Hildenborough Hall, Otford Manor or Treacle Towers as it is also known, decided to sell off about 20 acres of their farm land on the lower slopes of the Downs in an area of outstanding Natural Beauty (AOB). The land was purchased by a Company called Yalepalm Ltd of Bradwell on Sea in Essex who turned it into 227 separate small plots of land. Yalepalm's plan, which they referred to as the Pilgrims Way Estate, gave a presentation showing what could be a very dense housing development of ten dwellings per acre, but it was acknowledged that no planning permission had been obtained. Sevenoaks District Council were unable to purchase the land under a compulsory purchase order, and Yalepalm sold some plots to various people, mainly from the Greater London area. However the District Council did obtain an Order on the land which prevented any structure, even as small as a shed or fence from being built and restricts the access of caravans without planning permission.

In the event, very few owners did little to their newly acquired land although one person did lay on water and planted some fruit trees. Over the subsequent years, the Parish Council identified the owners of some of the plots and brought a number from Yalepalm who subsequently went into liquidation. The Parish Council then acquired from the Crown Estates the access paths and plots that had remained in Yalepalm's ownership. In 1988, after travellers set up a camp and were subsequently moved on, trenches, earth bunds and a gate were erected to prevent further encroachment onto the land.

It is some of these plots which have come up for sale and were advertised on the internet and which the newcomer had found for sale. I'm glad to say that the Parish Council is not 'selling' their land and that when these Leisure Plots do come up for sale, the Parish Council may buy them providing the price is right.

Dividing land into small areas and selling them as speculative plots which might one day get planning permission was very common in the 1970's, but we are very fortunate that the land remains much as it was when it was put up for sale.

August 2019. Mr. Burfield joined the Parish Council in May 2003 to April 2011 and after a four year absence, returned again in May 2015. During his time on the Parish Council Mr. Burfield made a significant contribution in all areas, and also served on most of the Parish Council's committees at some time. In previous years Mr. Burfield chaired the Emergency Services Committee and Finance Committee and more recently, the Planning Committee. He was also Chairman of the St. Edith Hall Management Committee for a few years. Mr. Burfield will be missed by his colleagues.

On request from Kent Council Highways and Transportation, the Parish Council drafted a **Highways Improvement Plan** which will, when finalised and adopted by KCC, prioritise highway improvements for Kemsing, enabling the Parish Council to apply its local knowledge in working with KCC who will provide technical advice for the best way to deliver the proposed improvements. It is likely that not all priorities will be funded given KCC's funding constraints, but it will ensure that the investment made by KCC has the most impact in making roads safer for the community where it is needed most.

Two external funding opportunities are currently being explored by the Parish Council with a view to improving the **Kemsing Downs Nature Reserve.**

The first is the **Old Chalk New Downs scheme** which aims to improve the coherence of the landscape and connectivity of chalk habitats by increasing their size, improving condition and the restoration of sites in locations where they historically existed. It is proposed to connect two isolated pieces of existing chalk grassland at the South West of Whiteleaf Down by clearing small trees and scrub to create a corridor to link the two existing areas. The second is the **Darenth Valley Living Landscape Partnership Scheme** (funded through the Heritage Lottery Fund), which aims to empower local communities to ensure the Valley remains a landscape of surprising beauty, rich in diverse habitats and with an impressive cultural heritage. This scheme will predominantly focus on providing a connecting link with Green Hill, The Dell and Goss Bank and will include scrub clearance, controlling dog rose and improvements to livestock handling as well as ensuring fencing remains adequate for grazing this important Local Wildlife Site.



COTMANS ASH HILL

his is the story of a hill lane climbing from the east flank of Kemsing village to the chalk hills that form the 'backbone of Kent'. Cotmans Ash Lane leaves the village at Heaverham -a hamlet that is fast beginning to think for itself when there is any threat to its identity. For the most of its journey the lane has steep banks or wild hedges which provide a larder of wild fruit and cover for many nesting birds.

The hill is a challenge for walkers and cyclists, but at the same time a dream for botanists and birdwatchers. Halfway up the hill, on a very sharp corner a five bar gate divides the hedge and a view westward over a sheep grazed wild flower meadow leads your eye over Kemsing across the rooftops of Sevenoaks and on to Whitley Forest at Ide Hill. On the distant tree line a giant Redwood comes into view – I know this giant, it is growing on the high grounds of West Heath School.

My high seat opposite the gap is well used by walkers and cyclists – I often sit there at sundown when I can watch a molten red ball sink over Polhill.

An ancient yew tree guards the entrance to 'Cotmans Ash' – a female tree –she feeds any number of birds with her sticky glistening berries, snotty goggs to country kids. I have put an owl box in the old tree which has always had a family raised in it, but this year I notice a pair of Rock Doves has moved in – I love their gentle purring. The Buzzards have as always raised their two chicks – the nest is more of a platform, an untidy affair and she always gives me a telling off if I go anywhere near the nest site.

For butterfly watchers June was dream with good spring hatchings of peacock, brimstone, meadow browns, gate keepers and ringlets. The blues came in great abundance to the local downland. Painted ladies turned up by the dozen on my old wallflowers, red admirals, great travellers are with us in number, and tortoiseshells seem to be making a comeback.

The woodland species are all turning up – speckled wood, green hairstreak, green veined white, but my annual journey to Whitley Forest to see the white admiral with the silver washed fritillary on the new bramble flower had other surprises "For there in the wood, a piggy wig stood" (Edward Lear) a young wild boar who was no less startled than me and stood his ground. I was surprised how compact he was, as well as being defiant. Many moths visit my woodland garden, particularly hawk moths, privet, poplar and elephant are regulars, not so regular is the humming bird hawk moth who has just turned up – for all the world a humming bird complete with hum, darting and hovering this way and that, a shadowy form whirring from flower to flower drinking nectar with his long tube tongue. A true prophet of lovely hot summer days to come.
